Easy Access Campers can be further described as being <i>social</i> or <i>solitary</i> campers. For Social Campers, the <i>social</i> aspect of the camping experience (eg. parties, group games and activities) is as important as the natural setting; while Solitary Campers favour small groups and little or no contact with other people.
